Director's Message

Who are we, and what do we do? We're families and individuals of all ages who've devoted our time to volunteering to help others. Some foster homeless rescue pets or farm animals. Some transport animals to the vet and adoption appointments. Some work on processing pet applications. Some pick up donations of all kinds, sort them, and deliver them to where they're needed most. Others do social media, websites, organizing, and fundraising. Some spend their time helping others in the community with one of our many free programs. Are you looking to volunteer your skills and time? Please consider reaching out to us about volunteering.

While our rescue is based in St. Landry Parish, Louisiana, we also have volunteers in Lafayette Parish, as well as in Texas. We've done the majority of our rescues and animal adoptions locally in Louisiana, but we have done rescues in Dallas. We've also done individual pet adoptions as far as California and Maryland, and one dog in Canada.

Our animal rescue's goal is saving one life at a time. But we need your help. Your support enables us to continue this goal of one animal, one person, one situation, one life, at a time. We are a small, all-volunteer local non-profit organization that reaches out as far and as strong as we can. But we can't do that without the support of our community. Our greatest need right now is monetary donations to help us pay off our current veterinary and vehicle debts. We appreciate donations of any size, no matter how big or how small. Everything adds up to help us continue our mission.

COVID-19 has severely hampered our rescue's ability to take in animals. Due to the pandemic we've had to change our methods of operation. We've been unable to have adoption events and in-person fundraiser events. The temporary lockdown caused many people financial strain, which in turn dropped donations drastically. It also severely slowed adoptions. Without donations to get the animals ready for adoption, they stay in our foster care system unable to be listed for adoption. Without adoptions, our foster homes are over capacity and unable to foster new rescues. Because of this, Acadiana Humane Society has been forced to be on an intake freeze to try to raise funds to get the current rescue pets ready and adopted. We've made a few exceptions for some emergencies. We have also agreed to take in some when they came with a foster home and partial sponsorship. But for the most part, our focus has been on online fundraising so we can get the animals already in our care seen and treated by our veterinarians as well as focusing on adopting out the ones that are ready.

Don't leave your fur baby in the car!

No one wants an emergency vet visit, especially when the situation could have been avoided. If your pet is with you then they should be with you at all times, whether it's cool outside, the A/C is on, or not. Don't take a chance with your pet's health; everyone will thank you in the long run.

You won't distress passersby, you won't get your windows shattered by a worried person, nor will you be eating a vet bill or having a fiscally painful discussion with a police officer or SPCA.

Why Does Your Cat Howl or Vocalize?

Excessive howling (talking) can be quite worrisome as a cat caregiver. There are many reasons your cat may vocalize:

- Certain breeds, like the Siamese, are more likely to vocalize than other breeds.
- Some cats are deaf (often white cats with blue eyes) and may vocalize more since they can't hear the noise.
- In general, cats "talk" to humans far more than they do to each other. We have made them more vocal because it is what we respond to. Being more aware of their other methods of communication can help. Cats only talk when we aren't seeing what they are trying to convey to us.
- Medical problems that result in a cat to having a headache, such as high blood pressure, may cause a cat to vocalize more.

What Should You Do If Your Cat's Howling Excessively?

- Schedule an appointment for a physical examination with your veterinarian.
 - A blood panel, including a thyroid hormone level, plus urinalysis will be needed for cats over eight years old, since thyroid disease is often responsible for the howling (especially if it happens late at night).

- A blood pressure test should also be run because high blood pressure and howling are linked.
- If all physical causes for howling can be eliminated, the next thing to do is have your cat's veterinarian do a thorough behavioral evaluation. Consider taking a video of your cat's home behavior for this type of visit.

Suggestions for Your Home

- Spray or diffuse feline facial pheromone products such as Feliway in your home.
 These products often help lower anxiety in cats.
- Enrich your home environment with cat trees and other climbing structures and make time for play! Enrichment and routine playful interaction can help lower their stress level and decrease vocalization.
- Reward your cat with treats when he or she is quiet. This way your cat will learn that quiet times BRING GOOD THINGS.
- Walk away, without reacting, when your cat is howling to show that this behavior does not elicit the attention that he is seeking.



Catnip Corner

Okay, so we actually don't recommend that you put a cucumber behind your cat. Why? Yes, it's funny to see on YouTube, but you're actually stressing your fur baby. Want to see things get really funny though?

Get them <u>figuratively</u> high. Your pet's day vision is garbage compared to ours, but their night vision and sense of smell FAR outweigh ours. That powerful sense of smell is how you give your pet a safe, artificial high that can make them quite cute or funny.

For cats, just let them have at it with the catnip. Some aren't into it, but if they really like it then it's hilarious watching them. Those big eyes, lazy rolls, and odd sounds they rarely make are always a blast. If they aren't into catnip, you could always try Feliway since sometimes this normally calming substance can make them so chill you'd think they're high.

Dogs: that's easy. Take them for a car ride, open the window a bit, and let them sniff that fresh air. Their olfactory organs are so strong that the scents are just too good for them to pass up. Ever wonder why you always see a dog smiling on an open-window car ride? Yep.
